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Executive Summary

It is not exaggeration to say that Pilvai is a renowned place of learning not only in Mehsana district but also in the whole region of North Gujarat. The institute, Shri U. P. Arts, M. G. Panchal Science and Shri V.L.Shah Commerce College, Pilvai was started by Uttar-Purva Gujarat Uchcha Kelvani Mandal, Pilvai in 1960 by donors truly devoted to the aim of education with a view to imparting higher education to brilliant but economically poor students belonging to rural area. This college is only one tri-faculty(Arts-Science-Commerce) college of the University. Ever since its establishment, the institution is benefited with sighted Managing Authorities and enthusiastic Principals. NAAC has accredited our institution at B level (72.7%) on dt. 31/03/2007. During the post Accreditation period, the status of Colleges with Potential for Excellence (CPE) has been awarded by the UGC.

The institution has spent 50 years of its esteemed existence. This institution is fulfilling its mission and vision and has fortified a number of youths with higher education. Three generations of people of this area have acquired higher education through this institution. In this smooth and successful completion of 50 years, a great contribution of local society has remained notable. And in order to show the gratitude for the same, the college decided to celebrate "Swarnim Mahotsav" (Golden Jubilee Celebration). Moreover, the aim of such a grand celebration was also to cherish relations.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The institute aims at inculcate the highest intellectual standards through rigorous academic commitment and discipline. Students are inspired to aspire to higher level of academic achievement by mastering the subjects they have chosen to study. The institution has initially setup its own mission-vision along with goals and objectives, and to put the same into practice, the institution has been endeavouring constantly. For this purpose with the course of time, new academic programmes at UG/PG level have also been introduced. These are in tune with the goals and objectives of the institution which are made available to its stakeholders through the college website, Central Library and the college prospectus.

The College conducts various courses in three streams. It offers a wide range of courses providing adequate academic flexibility in the choice of core and elective options. The semester and CBCS systems have been implemented last year. In UG level there are six Honours courses in B.A. and two Honours courses in B.Sc. are offered. B.Com. is an integrated honours course. Gujarati, Hindi, Sanskrit, English, History and Economics are taught as special subjects and Psychology is taught as a subsidiary subject in Arts Stream. Chemistry and Mathematics are taught as special subjects while, Physics, Botany and

Zoology are taught as subsidiary subjects in Science Stream. Advance Accountancy as a principal subject and Statistics and Secretarial Practice as subsidiary subject are taught in Commerce faculty. Since 1969 a P.G. Center in chemistry has been introduced and in its connection, a research center for Ph.D. had also been initiated. Since 1984 a P.G. Center in Hindi Subject has also come into existence. In the subject of Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Sanskrit, study up to Ph.D. is available. During last two years, self finance programmes like B.Sc. and B.A. (English) are introduced.

Industrial Chemistry has also been taught as a vocational subject since 1996. A certificate course in Journalism as a Career Oriented Programme and Industrial Chemistry as vocational course are also available. Short term skill development training programmes are organised frequently which help in employability. This is the only tri faculty college of the University therefore variety of subjects is offered. As a result the interdisciplinary approach of the teachers and students is developed.

Curriculum restructuring is a continuous process. Total 15 out of 33 teachers (45%) teachers of the institution have been actively sparing their services in different committees in the formation of university syllabi. While restructuring curriculum feedback from all stakeholders are collected and analyzed and the suggestions are communicated to BOS for improvement.

Through consultations with academic and industry experts, curriculum and relevance of the programmes are ensured. Training through project work, Career Oriented Programmes and participation in various social activities help to develop leadership skill and competence. At the ending of every semester, the academic audit of each department is conducted by the respective HOD and the overall audit of the college is done by the Principal and IQAC.

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college stands committed to make teaching and learning "Student Centric" which makes the students to think, analyze, be independent, original and creative. Students from rural area having diverse backgrounds and abilities are admitted. Their individual needs are properly addressed. The College ensures the competency of staff and helps the faculty to develop continuously. It promotes social awareness among students leading to commitment and action, and ensures a just and scientific evaluation process.

In accordance with Government/University rules, the institute admit the students on basis of merit, irrespective of caste, creed or gender with transparency. In our institution, a clever student is warmly encouraged as well as a weak student is taken a congenial care of. Identification of slow and advanced learners is made by the faculty on the basis of classroom interactions. Remedial and tutorial classes are arranged for slow and differently—abled learners. Special considerations are given to the financially weak and down troddn students through fee concessions/scholarships, free hostel accommodation and free text books from the Poor Boys Library.

The faculty is recruited through a rigorous selection process in accordance with the directives of the State Government. The institution possesses 33 teachers having higher academic qualifications. Out of the 33 teachers, 18 are Ph.D., 4 are M.Phil. and 3 are carrying on their research work. Eight teachers are the recognized research guides. Teachers have always been active to keep pace with the fast developing world and to For subject awareness. this purpose, they use to state/national/international seminars/workshops, they also participate in paper reading, their research articles are published in different research journals, and they duly attend the orientation and refresher courses. Many of the teachers use to write for their subject books and articles in different periodicals. Some are the columnist in leading periodicals. The teachers are continuously appraised in their own teaching abilities by the institution on the basis of students' feedback. No. of faculties have participated in live teaching programme like BISAG.

The teaching-learning process being student centric, the curriculum endeavours to integrate knowledge with skill which will sustain an environment of learning and creativity. Learning methods encourage students' participation through project work, group discussions, seminars, workshops, assignments, study/industrial/field tours, microteaching, guided library work, training in relevant software and e-learning. In order to mould teaching and learning into more interesting and effective form, various cocurricular activities are organized under the auspices of 'Pilvai college Vartul', Science Society and CSC. With a view to fortifying the same, the teachers make a frequent use of audio-visual aids and other teaching aids like models and charts. Teaching innovations through modern teaching aids and ICT facilities make the learning process more studentfriendly. Our faculties have also participated in live teaching programme named SANDHAN initiated by State Government and telecast by BISAG through satellite. The institute has developed a virtual class room and four AV rooms for this purpose. The students also make a use of internet facility available at Central Library and Girls' rooms for strengthening their learning process. We focus more on e - content, PPT and computer based teaching. We have provided LCD projectors in all the labs, laptops to all department, computers to all the staff members with Wi-Fi internet connectivity. We have 13 nodes of broadband connectivity. There are over 114 computers available in various office, departments, labs, library etc. The whole campus is connected with Wi-Fi internet connectivity.

Evaluation processes are clearly communicated to the newly admitted students. The University introduced the CBCS pattern and semester system for all the U.G.and P.G. programme. The internal evaluation including seminar, assignment and regularity of the student is improving student learning process. Especially this year we adopt new reform base evaluation using Unit test method for continuous learning. The college has OMR reader software and question paper generator software. All the departments provide question banks to the students. Many of our faculty members are examiners at the University, academic experts and board members. It helps them in getting vital information during evaluation and discussion, which they impart to our college students later. Formative assessment of the student is done on the following parameters: Assignments, Presentations, Field visits Industrial visits, Class interactions, Group discussions/Viva-voce, Workshops/Seminars, projects, written and practical tests,

curriculum based training, inter college competitions, overall attendance and conduct during the session. The institution results are higher than the university average results in most of the examinations. The best performers in university examinations are encouraged and facilitated by the institution. The best versatile performer of each stream is also awarded with the **Best Boy and Best Girl Award.**

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

We believe that an institution can become a centre of academic excellence only when a research culture exists and proliferates amongst faculty and students. The institution plays a very proactive role for promoting this culture. In spite of institution is situated in remote rural place, it has got a very good research output. There is a well equipped Chemistry Research Lab in the institute since 1970. Ours is the institution that has endowed 40 Ph.D. scholars in Chemistry. In Chemistry five faculty members are recognized research guides. Above 300 research papers have been published by Chemistry Department till the date.

We have got a nice research environment. The faculty is encouraged to pursue and complete doctoral and post doctoral work. Eighteen faculties are Ph.D. holders, and eight of them are recognized research guides not only of our University but also of other Universities. Eight teachers have pursued Ph.D. degree during last five years. Three teachers are engaged in research work. Two teachers of Botany and Zoology are recognized Ph.D. guides and 5 research scholars have pursued Ph.D. degree under the guidance of them. During last five years 120 (one hundred and twenty) research papers have been published by teachers. There is good citation of our research works. Nine books have been published at international repute. 9 minor research Projects have successfully been carried out by the institution, 6 minor projecs are going on while 3 project proposals have duly been sent for approval. 20 curious students have been registered for Ph.D. research under eight Ph.D. guides of the college. PG students of Chemistry are given research project task. They also participate in research conferences at various research institutes and organizations. The faculty received recognized Guideship, visited abroad for presenting research paper and perused Ph.D. degree is honoured on Annual Day.

The faculty members have presented their research papers regularly in national/state level conferences. The faculty is granted special leave for attending conferences to present papers. Two staff members have visited abroad for paper presentation. Some faculty member are sparing their services as member and reviewer in editorial board of various research journals.

Three state level and one national level conferences/seminars are organized by the institution during last five years.

A Research Facility has been set up in the college to assist research activities. The Principal has been very supportive and generous in this regard. Sophisticated instruments like FTIR, HPLC, AAS, Digital Balance, etc., for Chemistry research laboratory while instruments like BOD Incubator, Video Imaging System etc., for Biology research

laboratory are purchased during last two years under CPE Scheme. The library is equipped with a large number of research journals for the faculty. Separate Research section in Central library is developed which consists many thesis and bound back volumes of research journals since 1969. Internet facility and INFLIBNET facility for reference work are available for faculties and students.

The institution has always been at the forefront in consultancy and extension activities. 'Pilvai College Vartul', CSC, NCC and NSS Units stir a number of activities in co-ordination with other academic/social organizations. For various extension activities are under taken with collaboration of the Rotary Club, Vijapur, Gaiants group – Vijapur, Indian Red Cross Society, Prathama Group, etc. We have signed MOU with Sheth M. N. Science College, Patan and Pramukh Swami Science and P D Patel Arts College, Kadi for various academic/research activities and faculty/students exchange programme. We have also done collaboration by taking permission using sophisticated equipment and research facilities of some leading industries/research units like syncron research Pvt. Ltd., Ahmadabad. Alps industries, Ahmedabad and Dishaman Pharmaceutical, Bavla for doing our research work. We have carried out successfully Soil Helth Card Programme with the collaboration of agriculture department under the guidance of commissioner of Higher Education, Gujarat.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCE

Spread and blossomed in 49 acres of land, this trifaculty college has faculty-wise separate Arts, Science and Commerce Buildings. In addition, it has a separate well-furnished Administrative Building, Central Library Building, Sports Complex with Gymnasium, Boys Hostel, Girls Hostel, Staff Quarters, Rector House, Principal Bungalow, Canteen and 'Swarnim Smarak'. The college monitors the adequacy and optimum use of facilities available in the institution to maintain the quality of academic and other programmes.

Institution has such a rich library as hardly be found in the whole North Gujarat region. It has been an oasis where curiosity can easily be quenched. This library is abundant with 54,750 books, 26 research journals, 78 periodicals and 48 encyclopaedias. Apart from this, it has a separate research section containing preserved Back Volumes since 1970 and "Poor Boys' Library". The Library is rich in e – materials too. The issue of books will also be computerized very soon. The college has made arrangements for recording of BISAG lectures and storing them in CD form. The library is accessible from 10.00 am to 5.00 pm. The Central Library process spacious reading room and reading space for Girls, free access to the stacks, reprographic/audio/video facilities, CD/DVD's, access to e-learning, INFLIBNET, Foreign and Indian research journals/magazines and research cubicles with internet connections toquench the needs of students and staff.

The Administrative office is fully computerized with LAN, internet facility, and office management software facility. The **Research Laboratory** of chemistry is facilitated with four (04) computers, printers, internet and subjective / instrumental software facilities. The **Digital Educational Learning Laboratory** (**DELL**) established with the help of state Government is facilitated with 25 computers, LAN, internet and

spoken English software (GLOBARINA). The **Mathematics Computer Laboratory** is developed under CPE scheme having the facility of one (01) server, thirty (30) computers in LAN, MATLAB software. Four (04) **Audio Visual Class Rooms** which are connected through satellite for live telecast SANDHAN initiated by KCG, State Government. The **Virtual Class Room** developed under the CPE scheme from where the live telecast of the lecture can be viewed from various academic institutions outside the college by video conference system. The well-equipped **Examination Room** having facility of the two (02) computers, photocopiers, printer, ADF scanner, internet, OMR Reader software.

As far as the technological instruments are concerned, the institution has well updated 95 computers, 19 Laptops, Wi-Fi through Routers, Photocopier Machines, LCD Projectors, Television, Fax Machine, Scanner, UPS, Inverter, Biometric machine, CC TV Camera System, Classroom Audio Addressing System, etc. Regular maintenance and repairs of facilities is undertaken.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The institution has initially remained eager and active regarding all-round development of the students. The institution has developed a well-organized system of counselling and guiding students about their future career, higher studies and government schemes. We provide the required information to the students about different types of scholarships, free ship and fellowships. Government Scholarships are made available to the students belonging to SC, ST, OBC, EBC and Physically Handicapped categories. Other Scholarships from Postal Department, Central Directorate of Hindi. Students Welfare Fund are also made available to the concerned students.

Various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are geared up through SAPTDHARA, Pilvai College Vartul, NCC, NSS, Science Society, Community Science Centre and various departments. Students are encouraged to participate in various activities/competitions held by College/University.

Career Guidance Centre is run by the college which has been approved by the Employment Exchange Office, Mehsana. The Career Guidance Centre fixes Campus interviews in the college and also sends the list of qualified students frequently to different companies and factories when their requirement for placement arises. Training programmes for preparation of various competitive exams and admissions to higher courses are organized. Remedial courses are held so that weak students may be provided sufficient help. To enhance the proficiency in English and computer skill, various short term workshops are organized under CPE scheme.

Ever since the establishment, the college has earned a name in the field of University level sports. A large number of the college students have participated in University-State-regional and national level sports. Every year the institute has achieved the championships in 3-4 sports. About 30 students are selected for participation in Inter University Level sports every year.

We organize a felicitation ceremony to appreciate noteworthy achievements of students. We publish CHANDANA magazine and also have college website where the

achievements of students and staff both creative and academic are mentioned. The college has Grievance redressal Cell (Discipline Committee), Women Development Cell and Mahila Sanskar Sanskruti Club which help us in providing better support to our students.

The institution collects feedback from students through feedback form and suggestion boxes for improving the performance and quality of the institutional provisions.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- At the beginning of academic year IQAC elaborates an academic calendar which includes planning of admission process, enrolment process, academic activities (like lecture hours, seminars, workshops, academic industrial tours, unit test and internal test) and extension activities.
- 4 A time table is set by the time table committee at the beginning of the academic year which fulfils the prescribed number of hours for each subject.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

- The institution is affiliated with HNG University and therefore there is no scope for framing institutional curriculum on its own.
- → Total 15 (out of 33) teachers have actively participated as member of BOS of university 45% and KCG. They design and develop the curriculum prepared by the university.
- However a systematic mechanism is installed in the institution to look after the affairs of the feedback process and analysis through the member of board of studies.

- 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:
- 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institutionespecially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?
 - → The stakeholders are made aware of the evaluation process as it is a part of the prospectus which is given at the time of admission.
 - First year students are informed about the process of evaluation of the institute by the principal during the orientation/welcome programmes.
 - ♣ Individual subject teacher informs the students about criteria & method of internal evaluation in respective theory & practical subjects.
 - → Tentative dates for I & II test are planned by the IQAC and it is confirmed after discussion in the meeting of examination committee.
 - ♣ The date for the submission of internal marks is decided.
 - → The test time table is prepared by examination committee and displayed on the notice boards very much in advance to help the students in making plan for exam preparation.
 - ♣ The test results are displayed on the notice board for the information of students.
- 2.5.2: What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?
 - **University reforms**

- The University introduced the CBCS pattern and semester system for all the UG and PG programmes.
- The ratio of the weightage of marks in core compulsory subject is 70% through External Exam and 30% through Internal Exam as per the university rule.
- The university has raised the passing level from 35% to 40% in the theory exam.
- The internal marking system in practical in science at the under graduation level has been discontinued.
- The University practical examination of semester I to IV is given by the local examiners whereas the exam of semester V and VI is given by the examiners appointed by the University.

↓ College level

- Out of the 30 marks of the college internal exam, 20 marks are given on the basis of the marks obtained in the internal tests as per the method and 10 marks on the basis of seminar/workshop and regularity.
- A new experiment of taking Unit Tests instead of Internal exams has been introduced in the college this year.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- **↓** To ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reform of the University and college, following steps are taken by the institute :
 - The students are intimated of the implementation of above mentioned reforms by the IQAC and the Examination committee through noticeboard and by making announcement.
 - The students are acquainted with the new paper style, evaluation scheme and the period of examination.
 - The students are given the understanding regarding the importance of seminars, workshops and regularity in the internal evaluation.
 - Internal marks are displayed on the college notice board 10 days prior to University exam.
 - Subject teacher makes it a point to check the computerized internal marks before finally sending it to University.
 - A letter is sent and parents of the students who remain absent in theory and practical classes for long duration are called and extra efforts are made to ensure that his/her internal evaluation is not affected.

Summative Assessment:

The goal of summative assessment is to evaluate student learning at the end of an instructional unit by comparing it against some standard or benchmark. Summative assessments are often high stakes, which means that they have a high point value. Summative Assessment takes place at the end of the academic session which is conducted by the college during the Model Test at the end of the semester. Even if some students don't perform well or clear the eligibility condition, then an extra chance is given to the student for his/her evaluation. This process helps the students to gain confidence and to achieve good results. This is how the institution uses the formative and summative evaluation approach to measure the students' performance. The university conducts a summative evaluation at the end of each semester through the following.



Academic monitoring:


- The academic performance is monitored by observing the students performance in the classrooms through discussions, interactions, presentations, seminars, and assignments.







- 2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
 - → We follow C.B.C.S. pattern for evaluation of students. We have separate weightages for certain skills and performance of students. There is 10 percent mark for assignment, classroom performance, behaviour, regularity independent learning, communication skill and involvement in college activities. The other 20% is for unit tests and internal exams.
 - **↓** Displaying students' marks on the notice board.
 - **♣** By showing answer books to the students if he/she desires.
 - The answer books for the internal tests are preserved for one semester after the University results are declared. Prior to submitting the internal marks to the university they are displayed on the notice board and the students are informed to report any discrepancy in marks to the Principal.
 - ♣ Subjects where two teachers teach the same course, the answer sheets are assessed by both the teachers.
 - ♣ Rechecking and reassessment of answer sheets is also allowed.

4 College level:

- In case the students are dissatisfied with their result in the Internal Test they are allowed to apply for Rechecking/reassessment by filling in a prescribed form along with the fees for the same.
- The answersheet/s of such students are sent to the Head of the Department by the Principal/Examination Committee.
- The H.O.D. gets the reassessment done and submits the result along with his report to the Examination committee. If there is improvement in the result, it is rectified soon.

University Level:

- If a student is dissatisfied with his/her result in the University Exam he/She can tender an application in the college in a prescribed format in the stipulated time(15 days)
- The college forwards the application to the University for the needful action.
- Such answer sheets are reassessed by other examiners according to the rules of the University.
- The result is declared by the University when the procedure of Reassessment is over.

♣ In Campus:

- Internet service is available in the college for faculty and students. There are 114 computers with the facility of internet in each.
- The principal's office, the administrative Block and all the departments have the facility of internet.

- The college has internet facilities available at various places including library and research laboratory . students and teachers use it to a considerable extent during college hours.
- There are **13 internet nodes** from which about 114 Computers can be connected for internet surfing.
- The Administrative office is fully computerized with LAN, internet facility, and office management software facility.
- The Central Library of the college is fully computerized with internet facility. Teachers /students can access books from six (06) places.
- In Career Guidance Center, LAN, internet connection, printer, photocopier facilities are available for the students.
- The computers –internet facility is also available in 02 (two) **Girls Rooms** for girl students.
- All the departments are provided the facilities of Laptops and internet in their respective staffrooms.
- The **Research Laboratory** of chemistry is facilitated with four (04) computers, printers, internet and subjective / instrumental software facilities.
- The **Digital Educational Learning Laboratory (DELL)** established with the help of state Government is facilitated with 25 computers, LAN, internet and spoken English software (GLOBARINA).

- The **Mathematics Computer Laboratory** is developed under CPE scheme having the facility of one (01) server, thirty (30) computers in LAN, MATLAB software.
- Four (04) **Audio Visual Class Rooms** which are connected through satellite for live telecast of SANDHAN initiated by KCG, State Government.
- The **Virtual Class Room** developed under the CPE scheme from where the live telecast of the lecture can be viewed from various academic institutions outside the college by video conference system.
- The well-equipped **Examination Room** having facility of the two (02) computers, photocopiers, printer, ADF scanner, internet, OMR Reader software.
- College covered with Wi-Fi internet system so students and staff access internet in any place of the college.

- The committees prepare action plans and submit to the principal for approval. The committees carry out the activities and at the end of the academic year the conveners submit the reports of the work done to the head of the institution.
- The students' representatives are also nominated to carry out the co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Feedbacks available from the students and stakeholders are considered for the improvement of the plans and policies.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

- → Top Management of the College provides necessary guidance to the faculty in their pursuit of achieving higher qualifications through faculty improvement programmes, seminars and workshops. The leadership also encourages staff members to engage in active research so that students as well as society are benefitted.
- In the Management Executive committee meeting, head of the institute is also present to provide information and suggestions if any. In the meetings polices, plans and responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff through the head of the institution. If the situation demands, the President of the Management Committee holds meeting with the teaching staff & non-teaching staff to communicate directly. The teaching as well as the non-teaching and supporting staff follows the instructions and implement them in the interest of the institution.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- ♣ The policies and plans of the institute are constituted, monitored and evaluated by IQAC.
- To implement the plans and policies of the institute, various committees are constituted by the Principal, Vice Principal and Faculty Incharge.
- The faculty members are assigned different responsibilities and duties to perform when extra-curricular activities are conducted. Their performance is evaluated by top leadership from time to time.
- → The best working committee is appreciated and the staff members involved are suitably rewarded.

To groom leadership at student level, the students' representative are also encouraged and nominated to handle the co curricular and extracurricular activities.

- → The Principal empowers the Vice Principal, the Faculty In-charge to carry out various functions with operational autonomy such as financial powers invested with one of the faculty members.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

- ♣ Non-teaching staff undertakes training in computer skills, along with soft skill training.

- Faculty members are motivated to participate in short term training courses conducted by ASC, UGC and Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat (KCG).
- The College has organized seminars, workshops and conferences in various disciplines for its staff as well as for the faculty of other institutions in the state.
- → The Faculty members are assigned responsibility of SAPTDHARA where it is their responsibility to manage all activities within the budget allocated and write a report, this is an enriching experience for the faculty.
- **They are encouraged to present papers in seminars conferences and symposiums at the state, national and international level.**
- Faculty members of the institute are invited for expert lectures by SANDHAN for which the institute grants duty leave and other facilities.

 - → Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from UGC. The self appraisal report filled by the faculty and submitted to the concerned head of the department. Then he submits it to the head of the institute.

 - ♣ The Management always plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the staff.

 - The Performance Appraisal Report of the employee evaluated by higher authorities. The Principal and the management of the Institute, have regular meetings with the faculty members. The faculty members are motivated to take more active part in research. The positive aspects of the faculty members are appreciated.

 - ₩ Welfare schemes are provided as per government norms.
 - **♣** GSLI by government for all permanent employees.
 - Registered Credit Society is run by the college for the welfare of teaching and non-teaching staff. Nearly 95% of faculties are members of this society and get benefits.

 - → Due to Government policy for recruiting staff in grant-in-aid colleges, now a days the mobility of the staff becomes less in such institutes. The eminent faculty is given full freedom and environment by the authority to groom his/her academic career.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- Financial resources are available through State Government, UGC and various fees from students which are utilized and monitored by the top management, Principal, accountant & different committees.
- ♣ Collection of tuition fees, purchases of materials, books, stationeries, equipments and its maintenance, payment of bills are through centralized accounts department. All purchases are done through tender system. A petty cash is also maintained. Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers.
- → All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring, are incurred through cheques. Only duly authorized persons can operate through bank.
- ♣ The accounts are done by Telly so entries are monitored by authorities.
- 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.
 - There is a mechanism of checking, rechecking and crosschecking of accounts by the accountant, Office Superintendent and Principal periodically. Besides, an arrangement is made by the management for internal audit at least two times a year by C.A. firm, Patel Mankad & Co., Ahmedabad. In the case of spending of UGC grant, there is IQAC, Finance Committee and Library Committee. It finalizes the purchase of necessary equipments and books of the college. All purchases are done through tender system. The external audit is also done by the state government periodically. The grant of state government is finalized only after the audit.
 - → The last audit was done in July 2012. There were no major objections raised by the auditor.

 - **↓** The college's major sources of funding are as follows:

- ↓ In this celebration institute received funds of around Rs.88 lacks from our alumni, well-wishers and prestigious persons of the society.
- **4** This fund is being utilized for the academic and infrastructural development of institute.

 - Apply in CPE Scheme of UGC (Apply for CPE status).
 - To arrange expert lectures in different subjects.
 - Add more reference books, journals, periodicals and computer in the library.

- To strengthen, further career and educational guidance facilities for students.
- Organized motivation programmes for faculties.
- Planning to celebrate the **Swarnim Mahotsav** for completing glorious 50 years.
- To create special funds and grants from various sources to increase infrastructure facilities.
- To prepare and submit the proposal of Jubilee Grant of UGC.
- To prepare and submit the proposal of Development Grant UG & PG) and Merged Scheme under the 11th plan period.
- To construct new women's hostel for local female needs under UGC special Scheme.
- Subscribe the N-list programmes of INFLIBNET in library.
- To develop the facility of live telecast of SANDHAN.
- To prepare and submit the proposal of BSR scheme to UGC, New Delhi for renovation and development of science laboratories.
- To prepare plan and policies to execute and utilize successfully the Development Grant (UG & PG) and Merged Scheme Grant allocated by UGC during 11th plan period.
- To execute and utilize the first installment of CPE Scheme as per Action Plan.
- To organize various Faculty/student Development Programmes under CPE Scheme.
- To purchase new educational and administrative softwares.
- To furnished classrooms with audio-visual aids.
- To implement semester and CBCS successfully.
- To prepare plan and estimates of Seminar hall, Canteen and CC Roads constructed under Jubilee Scheme and submit to UGC for sanctioning it.
- To start the procedure of various construction/renovation projects sanctioned by UGC under Development Grant and Merged Scheme during 11th plan period.
- Provide internet facility to all.
- Purchase new software prescribe by University for beater administration.
- To introduce more advance teaching-learning equipments.
- To modify the examination pattern and internal marking pattern as per new semester and CBCS system.
- To aware and trained teachers and staff about CBCS and Semester System.
- c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.
- ¥ Yes, The IQAC does have external members. The external members help in planning out the Academic Calendar, plan and polices of the institution and also help in arranging eligible guest speakers. They have contributed donation

and have been helpful in collecting donation from society during 'SWARNIM MAHOTSAV'.

- d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?
- ♣ Students and Alumni are parts of IQAC. They give their effective feedback and suggestion for quality improvement. Their feedbacks play very important role in IQAC decision and proposal making.
- e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?
- ♣ The IQAC formulates programme and then it is placed in the staff meeting where it is discussed and then each faculty member is given responsibility as per the plan.
- 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.
 - ¥ Yes, Institution ensures the Quality Assurance of the academic and administrative activities according to framework developed by IQAC The quality assurance is ensured by teaching plan prepared by concerned faculty member.
- 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.
 - ¥ Yes, Institution makes an effort to provide training by arranging workshops and trainings viz attitude change, time management, stress management, interpersonal skills etc. Such types of training enhance the ability and quality work of staff. The teachers are also trained to deliver their lectures using ICT aids. The workshops are also arranged to enhance their computer skill and representation skill.
- 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?
 - Through HODs and senior teachers, the Principal remains in touch with performance level of teachers, completion of syllabus and other academic requirements and shortcomings of the teachers and students. Moreover there is a committee for evaluating annual results of University Examination class wise and teacher wise. Result of individual teacher is mentioned in the Self Appraisal Report. The external peer committee is also formed for this purpose. The external experts and educationalists of IQAC have also reviewed academic provisions and undertook Academic Audit.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

- → All compliances are made as per these three bodies from time to time. The best practices of the institution are:
 - According to the directions of UGC and NAAC for the internal quality assurance mechanism IQAC was formed.
 - Continuous interaction with the university leading to the incorporation of state government suggestions and UGC guideline.
 - Implementation of periodic recommendations of local inspection committee and NAAC.
 - Involving both teachers and students in activities that sensitize them to social and environmental issues.
 - The suggestions made by the external agencies such as knowledge consortium are given importance during IQAC meetings.
 - Suggestions from alumni and experts' visits have been of great value to IQAC's planning.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

To review the teaching learning process continuously, review and evaluation of all aspects is carried out and guided by the Principal under cooperation of Vice-Principal and Faculty I/Cs. The Principal also reviews the test results of each semester for each subject and teacher. This type of process enhances learning process in the institution. Teachers are made aware of their weaknesses and they try to improve them. The feedbacks of teaching learning process of each teacher from the students are taken, analyzed and passed to concerned teacher for improvement.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved a stakeholders' web by forming different platforms like College Advisory Board, alumni, Parent Teacher Meet and various committees with a fair representation of students. The IQAC, in the planning process, considers suggestions, collected from all the stakeholders to prepare perspectives on development. These developmental perspectives are discussed positively in the meetings of IQAC and decisions are conveyed to various internal and external stakeholders.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

- → This institute is set up in a pollution-free environment in nature's abode. There are more than 5000 trees in the campus which are taken care by the institute. More trees are grown by the students, too. Natural environment helps positively for the best educational system. It is our precious asset which is far from urban area and industry.
- → We celebrate world environment day, ozone day, Tree Plantation, etc., for environment consciousness. Sign boards regarding green and clean campuscampaign are displayed all around the campus.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

Energy conservation

- → The classrooms and staff rooms are airy and well-lighted due to big windows, greenery and open space in all buildings which require less electricity. The students and staff members are aware about the importance of electricity, so they utilize minimum electricity and try to save energy.
- ♣ Chemistry laboratories had gas plant based on Solvent, which is replaced by LPG which serves two purposes- financial benefit and protection of environment.

• Use of renewable energy

♣ No initiatives are taken by the college for using renewable energy. We are planning to install solar units inside the campus.

• Water harvesting

→ There is an underground tank to store rain water in Science Building. The saved water is used as distilled water during Chemistry Practical throughout the year. Rain water is harvested in the large campus automatically. Consumption of water is done economically.

Plantation

♣ Entire campus is surrounded by more than 5,000 different types of trees. Every year the students of NCC & NSS plant more trees & look after them. A Botanical Garden is set up by the Biology Department in which a 'POLY-HOUSE' for variety of plants is developed.

• Hazardous waste management

→ There is an eco-friendly system for chemical- waste from the Chemistry -lab. Effective housekeeping system is practiced where hazardous waste management is effectively taken care. Chemical waste is destroyed by appropriate treatment and paper waste is discarded by fire. Every department has dust-bin which is cleaned up regularly.

• e-waste management

Less proportion of e-waste is generated. Strict procedures are followed where the e-waste management is taken care by the management and housekeeping systems

7.2 Innovations

→ To create a positive impact on the functioning of the college, various Administrative and Academic innovations are introduced during last five years.

Administrative Innovations

- The Administrative Office is fully Computerized. With the help of Office Management Software, the administrative works like, collection of fees, admission procedure, certificates issuing, internal mark calculation, scholarships, accounts, GR, I card, data record, are successfully done by office. The important notices and information are communicated to each student by SMS.
- The Prayer is done through Public Announcement System in every classes and laboratories daily. The important information and instructions are announced by this system very easily.
- To maintain punctuality in lectures and examination time, the electric bell is rung automatically by School Bell Machine installed in Central Library.
- Bio-metrics system is introduced for the presence of the employees to maintain regularity.
- The installation of CCTV cameras has made the task of observing the academic activity very easy and the system also ensures the protection of the students and staff against any untoward incident.
- Students and parents are invited to give their suggestions, feedbacks and comments through college web-site. Admission forms and other administrative forms are available on the college website and students can fill up its online.

Academic Innovations

- There are 13 internet nodes from which about 114 Computers can be connected for internet surfing.
- The **Central Library** of the college is fully computerized and with internet facility. Teachers /students can access books from six (06) places. Separate research section is developed for reference work.
- **Poor Boys' Library** provides free books and study-materials to economically backward students.
- Library up-gradation with increase in number of subjective reference books, e-books, research journals, periodicals, newsletters. Collaboration with N-list is made for the benefit of the research students of the respective subject.
- In Career Guidance Center, LAN, internet connection, printer, photocopier facilities are available for the students.
- The computers –internet facility is also available in 02 (two) **Girls Rooms** for girl students.
- College covered with Wi-Fi internet system so students and staff access internet in any place of the college.
- All the departments are provided the facilities of Laptops and internet in their respective staffrooms.
- The **Research Laboratory** of Chemistry is facilitated with four (04) computers, printers, internet and subjective / instrumental software facilities.
- The **Digital Educational Learning Laboratory (DELL)** established with the help of state Government is facilitated with 25 computers, LAN, internet and spoken English software (GLOBARINA).
- The **Mathematics Computer Laboratory** is developed under CPE scheme having the facility of one (01) server, thirty (30) computers in LAN with MATLAB and Mathematica software.
- Four (04) **Audio Visual Class Rooms** which are connected through satellite for live telecast SANDHAN initiated by KCG, State Government.
- The **Virtual Class Room** developed under the CPE scheme from where the live telecast of the lecture can be viewed from various academic institutions outside the college by video conference system.
- The well-equipped **Examination Room** having facilities of the two (02) computers, photocopiers, printer, ADF scanner, internet, OMR Reader software. The examination and evaluation process are became easier by these facilities.
- Unit-test ,Seminars and Assignments have brought positive results .

- Special faculty/students development programmes are undertaken by instituion under the CPE scheme.
- Expert lectures are arranged to enrich subjective, spiritual and social strength of staff and students.
- Information regarding the various schemes for SC,ST, OBC, female and other type of scholarship scheme are displayed on the notice board and office provide total support to get this benefit for needy students.
- To act as a bridge between academia and society number of co-curricular and cultural activities organized by NSS, NCC, YRC, Sports, with cooperation of GOs NOGs.
- To meet the need of industry, instrumental training programmes are regularly organized to develop practical skills. To meet the need of industry, instrumental training programmes are regularly organized to develop practical skills.
- A Research Facility has been set up in the college to assist research activities. Sophisticated instruments like FTIR, HPLC, AAS, Digital Balance, etc., for Chemistry research laboratory while instruments like BOD Incubator, Video Imaging System etc., for Biology research laboratory are purchased during last two years under CPE Scheme.

Title: Social Responsibility Programmes (SRP)

- Goals
 - The institution has voluntarily been yoked with the responsibility of social progress.
 - To establish social responsibility among the staff and the students.
 - To fabricate programmers for social awareness.
 - To arouse the qualities like leadership, unity and self-confidence.
 - To inspire students to blossom various skills.
 - To make the students potential for learning and earning.
 - To make the students aware of equal chances and woman empowerment.
 - To apply academic assets of institution for social progress.

• To co-operate actively in Government's social welfare programmes.

The institution is consciously aware of social responsibility. In order to meet abovementioned goal, the institution forms various programmes, among which, the following two are salient:

- (1) Soil-Health Card Programme.
- (2) Drama for Development (D4D)

1. Soil Health Card Programme

The Context

- ♣ More than 65 % of the people of our nation have directly been engaged with agriculture, nevertheless, agriculture contribution in National Income is comparatively 15% less. In agricultural progress of India, the application of technological and scientific innovations have brought a plenty of changes, and thus, made a notable contribution in agricultural field.
- ♣ To increase agricultural productivity, it becomes highly necessary for a farmer to know the soil elements of his farm before farming. The fertility and productivity depend upon inherent soil elements. If the farmer comes to know the proportion of important soil elements (N, K and P) present in soil and the conductance & pH of soil, he can easily comes to know which crop and how much fertilizer his land will require. Such a knowledge will lead the farmer to a large productivity of crops. With a view to making the farmer aware of abovementioned fact, the Government authorities of Gujarat have stirred an ambitious project to provide a **Soil Health Card** to each farmer of all over Gujarat.
- The task of providing a Soil Health Card was rather huge and tiring. Moreover, the State Government didn't have such a big infrastructure for agricultural research. In order to achieve this huge task of project in time, the State Government authorities handed over this project to the science colleges of Gujarat, because sample tests in such an enormous quantity were not possible at incomplete laboratories for agricultural research in Gujarat, and therefore, it was decided to get this task done by teachers and students of various science colleges of Gujarat and all the colleges accepted it. Accordingly, for last three years, the task of soil test & analysis is smoothly and successfully going on in Chemistry Department of our institution.

The Practice

- → For this prolonged mission of Agricultural Development and for the programme of providing Soil Health Card to each farmer, the authorities of the State Government employed Gram Sevaks and some local agencies to collect soil samples.
- ♣ On scientific basis, these collected samples were labeled and sent to our laboratory for testing.

- → The authorities of the State Government allotted the grant of Rs. 80/- per sample. This grant remained helpful to our institution to purchase necessary equipments and chemicals. This task was performed with the help of the staff and students.
- → The collected samples were labeled and their elements: Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Potassium, etc., were tested and analyzed. The pH and Conductance of the soil samples are also measured.
- ♣ Under the guidance of the Principal Dr. Sanjay S. Shah and the co-ordinator Dr. R.S. Dave, teams of students were formed. Each chemistry teachers was entrusted duties' of a team leader. Each team was allotted a particular duty. Through these teams, the soil samples were accurate by analyzed on the basis of scientific in formations.
- → Thus, through accurate guidance, tiring labour of teams and teachers the following number of Soil Health Cards were prepared. Finance allotted to our institution and expenditure occurred during three years are as following.

The first success of this programme, as we feel, is —we completed the analysis and testing of 28618 samples entrusted to our institution by the State Government authorities during three years. Thus, we successfully overcome the entrusted work and its philanthropic gain was enjoyed obviously by our institution, staff and students and by the society too.

2. Drama for Development (D4D)

Context

The activity of drama has a very significant role in social responsibility. Drama is a live art. Moreover it is an important means of mass communication. Drama is a very useful medium of presenting the social problems before the people in an interesting and effective way to make them aware of them. The activity of performing drama in our college is also carried out with the aforesaid purpose in mind. Having prepared the drama with the theme based on various very important social problems, it is performed at various places. We have been doing it for last twenty years.

The Practice

Drama for development is a campaign. The presentation of the social problems through drama is the live and entertaining part of education. The drama is

performed in various state level competitions of colleges and universities. Later on they are also presented in the surrounding villages and towns. Thus, the institution shoulders the responsibility of bringing awareness in the society.

- About 10 students participate in this activity every year. Five plays have been performed in the last five years based on various social problems.
- Shri Kartikey Bhatt, an Associate Professor of Economics and coordinator of Natya Dhara, is interested in writing and directing drama, He holds meetings with the students every year who are interested in drama. At that time the social problems and the problems of the state are discussed and they decide to perform a play on a particular and especially current problem.
- Despite their rural background and lack of proper training at school level, the
 participating students perform really well. They strive hard to present light
 and satirical plays in an interesting manner. They also spare time for
 rehearsals.
- One play is prepared after a practice of almost one and a half month and it is presented first in the youth festival held every year by the university and in various state level competitions. Then, it is performed in the surrounding villages and towns.
- Since the social set up of the area surrounding the college is very rigid and conventional, the girls are not allowed to participate in public programmes. Inspite of that our college motivates them to participate to bring out their latent potentiality and talent. Thus, by presenting the plays in which the women have more significant roles than men and by providing them a very good platform for the all-round development of their personality and by inculcating self confidence in such girl students the institution does a great favour to the society.
- Looking at the theme of the plays performed during the last five years would give the notion how useful the performance is to the society in general. For example, to highlight the problem of migration from the villages to the cities the play named 'Halone Apda Malakma' was presented, for the problem of poverty and criminalization 'Bozo' was performed, to show the decreasing sensitivity of the society 'Bari Barna Vagarnu Makan' was presented and to show the inherent human sentiments 'Chalne Apne Paini Jaiye' was successfully performed. About 5 to 7 boys and almost equal number of girls participated in these plays.
- These plays were performed at various places like Ahmedabad, Rajkot, Prantij, Vijapur, Unjha and in their surrounding places.
- These plays won many prizes in the state level competition. The prizes were for best writer of the play, best actor and best actress etc. The media also took the note on a wider scale.

Evidence of Success

Gain to the students

- Drama and other arts related to it flourished.
- The qualities of teamwork, confidence and planning developed in the students.
- They could establish recognition in the society.
- They came into contact with various people in the society and could create awareness about various problems and issues.
- The students who won prizes in the competition got certificates and were proud.
- The students of science, commerce and social science became familiar with art and it attributed to interdisciplinary approach.
- Among a few activities which are carried out jointly by the three faculties Science, Commerce and Arts, drama is one of them. Thus, it proves to be the best activity for the identity of the college.

Gain to the Society

- It got entertainment by the natural and God gifted talent of the students.
- Awareness regarding the social problems like abortion of girl foetus, urbanization poverty and criminalization and the insentivity of the society could be created through the dramatic presentation of the same.
- Girls generally remain inactive in public matters here but this provides them a platform to come forward. This improves their status in the society.
- It is also a step in the direction of women empowerment and to enable them to avail of equal opportunities.
- Entertaining activities like drama are rare in this area so the performance of plays provides a good sort of healthy entertainment.

Gain to the Institution

- This activity of the institution is helpful in creating its identity in the society.
- It also gets monetary reward sometimes. The amount may be trivial but it's a great compliment in terms f achievement.
- By getting rank in the university level competitions the college got good name, fame and prestigious certificates.
- Performance of drama is the unique identity of Pilvai college.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

• The art of drama is the mingling of all the arts in one. It's a powerful means of communication but it is not only difficult to prepare but also time consuming.

To carry out the task of rehearsal along with regular educational activity is a really challenging work but the institution has been successfully doing it for the last twenty years.

- The greatest hurdle in the activity of drama is that the students have to engross themselves and spare their invaluable time which sometimes affects their study adversely. But the professors of the college do a great favour to them by giving them special guidance whenever they require.
- As it requires a lot of rehearsal beforehand, students have to spare time. Therefore, the students and the concerned professor carry out activity of rehearsal on holidays and after the teaching schedule on working days so that their academic performance is not adversely affected.
- The dramas meant for social awareness present the problems of women, even in the theme also women have a significant and leading as well as inspirational role. So it is necessary that the girls participate in this activity with special interest and fervours. But it is difficult to inspire them for participation as they hail from such a conventional and rigid social and familial background. By convincing their parents and guardians we are able to get their consent for the same.
- Drama is an expensive activity. Keeping in mind the limited financial and
 infrastructural means simple dramas are prepared and are successfully
 presented despite the constraints just mentioned. Maintaining consistency in
 this activity is not only difficult but also a challenging task. We are proud that
 our institution has been able to do so for last twenty years.





SECTION - I: PREFACE

Shri U.P. Arts, Smt. M.G. Panchal Science & Shri V.L. Shah Commerce College is a grant - in - aid college of Gujarat located in a village Pilvai in taluka Vijapur of Mehsana district. This college was established in 1960 and is affiliated to Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University, Patan. The institution is recognized by the UGC under 2(f) and 12(B). The college is essentially rural in nature and has a vast campus spread over 49 acres. As the name indicates it has courses in all the three basic faculties of Arts, Commerce and Science. There are overall twelve programmes out of which eleven have annual system of examinations and the vocational program in Industrial Chemistry has semester system.

Out of 28 permanent teaching faculty members with two female members. In addition four lecturers are on ad-hoc basis. The teacher-student ratio at present is 1:50. Out of the total faculty 36 percent teachers hold Ph. D. degrees and 7 percent M. Phil. Degree. Twenty five teachers are recognized P.G. teachers by the university. Some of the teachers are engaged in research and 6 minor research projects funded by UGC are completed.

The college has two NSS and one NCC unit. The college library has 47,335 books and subscribes 18 journals. There are 18 computers in the college and four departments make use of this facility. The college has a boy's hostel, sports ground and a gymnasium. About one third of the total students are female and most of the day scholars come from near by villages who commute daily by buses.

The peer team comprising Professor Vinod P. Saxena, former Vice - Chancellor Jiwaji University, Gwalior as Chairman; Professor Ramchandra Rao, former Principal, S.R.R. Government Degree College, Karimnagar as member and Dr. F.A. Fernandes, Registrar of Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Vidyapeeth (Deemed University) as member co-



ordinator visited the college during February 15 - 17, 2007. They went through the exercise of confirmation of facts given in Self Study Report and also explored other soft details. The team interacted with principal, management, students, parents, alumni, teaching and non-teaching staff and accordingly prepared the report as given below.

SECTION - II:

CRITERION - 1: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The Institute has a lofty goal. The prime objective is to provide access to all needy students of all castes and creeds and students of disadvantage sections of the society and to introduce courses taking into consideration the regional needs.

Being an affiliated college, it is bound to base its curriculum prescribed by the University. However the University has taken into consideration broad framework of the UGC curriculum. The college has six programmes. B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., M.Sc., M.A. and vocational course in Industrial Chemistry. The college is also recognized center for Ph.D. in chemistry. Thus, program options are limited. Within the limits prescribed by the University, flexibility is provided to the students in selection of optional subjects. There are core options with language and social science. Elective options are provided in Arts, Science and Commerce. There are some faculty members who have contributed for the preparation of the syllabus in their subjects since they are the members of the Board of Studies. From time to time the faculty takes the opinion of the students, management, guest speakers and conveys it to the respective Boards of Studies. There is no formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students, alumni, employers, community, academic peers and industry. However, the suggestions are taken in an informal way and conveyed to the BOS of University to modify the syllabus if required. There is no scope for the Institution to add to the prescribed syllabus. However, while teaching, the concerned teachers add their inputs regarding value orientation. The University also has introduced new trends in some subjects like introduction of Industrial Chemistry.

There are no interdisciplinary courses. Job oriented training is done in chemistry by organizing industrial visits. Computer training is provided to few science students. The other students are given training with nominal charge by outside agency and they are awarded with certificates. To a greater extent community orientation is done through

NSS and NCC units. 'The Plivai College Vartul' also renders community oriented activities. There is one 'Community Science Centre' in the college to spread science temper in and around local community.

CRITERION - 2: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The institution follows the rules of the University in respect of admission to various courses. Admissions to first year B.A., B.Sc., B. Com. and M.A. are done on the basis of merit whereas admission to M. Sc. Chemistry Part-1 is made by the Central Admission Committee of the University. 7% seats are reserved for S.C., 13% for S.T., 27% for SEBC, 3% for physically disabled and 1% for sports personnel. Additional 5% marks are added to the marks of a lady student as per the norms of the state government. The college conducts an objective test for the students admitted to the various courses to understand their level of ability and to assess their knowledge. Students from disadvantage sections are provided with scholarships. They are allowed to borrow books from 'Poor Boy's Library'.

Academic calendar is prepared in consultation with the co-ordinators of examination committee, cultural committee and sports committee by taking into consideration university's academic calendar. The details are given to the faculty and students before the commencement of academic year. Concerned teachers prepare the detailed plans in consultations with HOD. Dates of internal examinations are decided well in advance. The reference material is given to students. Review of the academic calendar is done by HOD's and the Principal.

Total number of teaching days is about 180. Arts and Commerce sections run classes from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Science section is held from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. There is a central library, which is reported to be kept open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. However there is only one ad-hoc librarian and one peon.

Teachers predominantly use the lecture method. Practicals are conducted in science stream. Seminars, workshops, debates, assignments, group discussion, educational tours, industrial visits, botanical tours, lectures by subject experts are also held. Educational aids, OHP, LCD, charts, VCD, tape recorders, films, TV are used time to time.



Faculty makes use of reference books, research journals and participation in workshops, seminars to improve their knowledge and keep themselves updated in their discipline. Some teachers have developed research aptitude and published articles. Out of total 28 permanent faculty members there are 10 Ph.D holders. Two have got M.Phil degree, six have registered for research for Ph.D. The teachers are encouraged to do research by providing study leave and library facilities.

Teachers are recruited by following the norms of Gujarat Government and UGC rules. Depending on workload, NOC from commissioner of higher education is obtained and through proper selection committee appointments are made. Sometimes, ad-hoc / temporary appointments are made. Management pays the salary for the ad-hoc appointments from the meager resources. Subject development, activities are done through various subject vartuls. The faculty from the department of Sanskrit received University award 'Gauri Sankara Vaidya'. Teachers from Department of English and Gujarati were invited to train Government officials.

The Principal monitors teacher's performance. Every year results are analyzed and suggestions are made accordingly. Teacher's attention is drawn specially to the poor performance of the students. There is a committee which supervises the research activities of the faculty. By and large student's suggestions regarding teacher's performance are invited by following the evaluating questionnaire method prepared by NAAC. Teachers are given academic diary in which Swot analysis are done by the teachers, which are reviewed by the HOD and the principal whenever required.

There are two terminal examinations having 30% weightage in the final examination. These examinations are compulsory for the students in a year in addition of unit tests. The schedule of unit tests, project reports/visits and tours is also given. College unit tests are assessed by the internal faculty. The final examinations are conducted by the university and central assessment is carried out externally. Whenever a particular unit of syllabus is over, end examinations are conducted.

The institution has committee for redressal of grievances. Generally, these are related to the assessment. In case of poor performance of the students, their parents are informed accordingly. Grievances of the students if any, are heard and action is taken. There is a continuous assessment.



CRITERION - 3: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY & EXTENSION

There is a research committee to facilitate and monitor research activity. Faculty members are made aware of various schemes of UGC and other funding agencies. Teaches are motivated to undertake minor and major projects. Some teachers participate in local, state and national level conferences and seminars. Some financial help is given to them by the college. Their lectures are adjusted to enable them to participate in conferences. The college has made allocation for equipments, chemicals, and reference books in the annual budget to the tune of Rs.60,000/-. Twenty four teachers have participated in conferences and seminars and so far, Rs.33,105/- have been spent from 10th plan UGC grants for various activities.

Eighteen faculty members have participated at the university and state level seminars and 10 have participated at the national level seminars / conferences. Sixteen teachers have published text books and general books in 2005-'06. Six teachers have published research articles in the year 2004-'05. Seven teachers have published their research articles in the year 2005-'06.

P.G. students in Chemistry are encouraged to write project reports and both PG Chemistry and Hindi students write term papers. So far 25 candidates have completed Ph.D. in the department of Chemistry and 8 have registered for Ph.D. There are 2 research laboratories equipped with chemicals, glassware, computer and a printer. There are 18 national level periodicals. 36 encyclopedias and bound back volumes of 18 research journals are available in Chemistry. Technological aids like LCD projector, OHP, T.V., VCD, slide projector, laser printer, scanner, and other facilities have been made now available for the researchers. The Department of Chemistry has been active in research activities since 1965. Two faculty members are recognized Ph.D. guides. The department of Chemistry has got a unique distinction of having published 44 research papers in the last 5 years. Six minor research projects have been completed and seven proposals for minor projects have been forwarded to various funding agencies.

The college has a record of community outreach programmes. The community science center has been rendering service by organizing lectures, demonstrations,



exhibitions and film shows to eradicate superstitions, to cultivate scientific temper and interest for science and technology.

There are two programme officers and 200 students in the NSS unit. Through the medium of street play efforts are made to create a campaign for anti-foeticide by the units. Campaign for empowerment of women, cleanliness, educating children etc. is undertaken. College has successfully organized HIV & AIDS awareness programmes and has adopted a village for its out reach programmes. Literacy drive is also undertaken by the NSS unit.

Collaboration is sought by the Rotary club and Giants group for social work. The campaign for food adulteration awareness among the villagers is undertaken. Medical checkup camps with the co-operation of Vijapur Doctor's Association. Environmental issues are also taken for discussion with the help of Govt. forest department.

College has also made some efforts to seek the collaboration for the outreach programmes from Gujarat Council on Science and Technology, Vikas Vartul Trust – Bhavnagar and Gujarat Ganit Mandal – Ahmedabad in addition to North Gujarat University, Patan.

CRITERION – IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The college has a vast campus spread over 49 acres of land. The college is housed in 3 separate buildings for Arts, Science and Commerce with 27 class rooms, 02 Research Laboratories, 04 Chemistry Laboratories, 01 Industrial Chemistry Laboratory, 02 Physics Laboratories, 01 Biology Lab, 01 Mathematics Laboratory, Biology Museum and Community Science Centre. The college also provides hostel facility for boys and residential house for Principal. The College possesses play grounds, gymnasium, space for indoor games and rooms for NCC, NSS and Sports. The college has one botanical garden. Facility of safe drinking water for students and staff is arranged through water cooler. Water facility is available in the campus from tube well along with uninterrupted power supply round the clock. Funds are raised mainly from UGC grants with financial aid from the management and other means. New administrative building is ready and constructed with the assistance from Xth Plan Development Grant of UGC.



The college library consists of 47,335 books. The number of titles are 29,976. A good number of books are in the pipeline for disposal. The college subscribes 46 magazines, 18 Indian Journals and has 168 back volumes of Journals. It also acquired 54 CDs relating to Electronic information. The college has spacious reading room for the benefit of students. Poor Boy's Library is also maintained with 10,099 books along with 36 encyclopedias. The carpet area of the Central Library is 5,573 sq. ft.

The library is reported to work from 7.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on all working days. Community science centre has been started with the financial assistance of Gujarat Council of Science and Technology (GUJCOST).

The classrooms of the college are optimally utilized. The college encourages the use of infrastructure facilities by external agencies. Local bodies and sports clubs are permitted to conduct Sports and athletic events in the college play ground. The college has enforced into Annual Maintenance Contract with a Klaxon Services, Mehsana.

The college encourages Sports and Cultural activities. It has provided modest infrastructure facilities for outdoor games like athletics 400 meter track, Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Hockey, Cricket and Kabaddi. The college has a hostel. At present 50 students avail the facility. The college also has a Career Guidance Cell.

CRITERION - V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college publishes prospectus annually which gives details about courses offered, the eligibility criteria, fee structure and the hostel facilities. About 56.19 % and 83.75 % of the students appeared qualifying examination after minimum period of study during the last two years (2004-'05 and 2005-'06) respectively and the corresponding drop out rate is 43.81% and 16.25%.

The exact figure of those who gain employment after UG / PG studies is not available. Last year Dishman Pharmaceuticals has selected six students of Chemistry for potential employment. Guest lectures are periodically conducted on socially relevant topics by mobilizing the support of expert teachers from Universities and affiliated colleges.

Scholarships are available to S.C., S.T., O.B.C., E.B.C. and meritious students by the Government of India and State Government. Six hundred seventy one students



are provided with an amount of Rs. 10,58,601/- by way of various scholarships. Twenty five students are also given freeships amounting Rs. 13,600/-.

The college also supports financially backward students using poor students aid fund. Financial support is given for the needy students who participate in extracurricular and sports activities. There is a drama group, which provides a platform to talented students and teachers. Medals and prizes are awarded for the best performance of the students in the University examinations. The faculty of the college including retired faculty instituted memorial awards for securing highest marks in the concerned subjects. Gujarat Government sponsors Shahid Virkinariwala Vidyarthi Suraxa Juth Vima Yojana. Under this Yojana if a student dies in an accident, his/her family is given Rs. 1 lac towards financial help.

The college has achieved important positions in University level competitions. The college won the women championship in Cricket, Tennis, Kabaddi and Soft Ball during the two successive years 2005-'06 and 2006-'07. Boys have also won championship in Kabaddi into two successive years of 2005-'06 and 2006-'07.

The college publishes an annual magazine 'Chandana' which includes articles written by students and teachers. Various workshops and seminars are organized to make female students aware of their legal rights.

The college has active NCC unit under a teacher of the rank lieutenant. The unit has 160 cadets with an additional women's wing 29 cadets. Three cadets have passed 'C' certificate and 19 cadets passed 'B' certificate during the year 2005-'06. The institution collects feed back from the students and employees and act as per their suggestions for the improvement of quality education.

The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell. It looks after the complaints and initiates action in consultation with Principal. Based on the ability test conducted at the beginning of the academic year, the students are divided into the small groups allotted to teachers for academic and personal counseling.

CRITERION - VI: ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT

The college is run by the Uttar-Purva Gujarat Uchcha Kelvani Mandal Trust. The vision of the institution is to educate and enable youth to enhance the dignity and progress of the society as well as nation. The mission of the college is to make the rural



youth aware and respect the constitutional values and train the youth to inculcate vocational skills for the adoption of self-employment.

The structure of the trust constitutes general body, trustee mandal, managing body, academic council and executive committee. The meetings of managing body and executive committee are normally held twice in a year and local committee meets in each month. The local committee takes leading role in the day to day administration of the institution. It allocates funds for development for various departments on the basis of recommendations and periodically evaluates the progress made. The college planning committee consisting of Principal, Head of Departments and other senior faculty prepares the plan of action and also submits the requirements for the development of the college.

Since the college is grant -in- aid and as such follows rules and regulations laid down by the Government, the University and its own Governing body. About 84% of the posts are filled with permanent teachers. There are four ad-hoc lecturers against 28 permanent teachers. Payment for the ad-hoc lecturers is paid by the management.

The recruitment of faculty is done by a selection committee consisting University nominee, nominee of the Government, representative of the management, Principal, HOD of the concerned department and external subject expert by following the rules and regulations of UGC and the Government.

The academic activities are looked after by the staff council constituting of Heads of Department with Principal heading the council. The academic calendar is prepared by a special committee of the college.

The fee collection is as per the directions of the Government and University. The budget deficit of the college was compensated by the Managing Committee of Uttar–Purva Gujarat Uchcha Kelavani Mandal.

The college has a few welfare measures for the staff and students. The college also has Co-operative Credit Society which advances loan to the tune of 20 times of the basic pay at reasonable interest rate.

The college has recently established a Grievance Redressal Cell. There is also complaint box. The Principal chairs the meeting of the cell.

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CRITERION - VII: HEALTHY PRACTICES

The following are the healthy practices pursued by the college:

- > The teachers undertake quality checks of the students relating to the academic performance like attendance regularity, class tests etc. They also monitor the participation in extra curricular activities and discipline of the students.
- > The academically weak students are identified by the tutors and imparted remedial coaching. The needy are provided access to extra learning materials. Special coaching is given to students who have missed the classes due to unavoidable reasons.
- Students are involved in the process of evaluation of teachers. Students do not mention their names. The feed back received will help the teacher to know his strength and weakness. On the basis of feed-back, the Principal acts further.
- The college is putting effort to bring in community orientation in its activities.
- Community Science Center conducts science fair wherein charts and models are exhibited to create interest in the science subjects among the rural school students.
- The practice of teaching the science subjects by the Principle and other science faculty to the students of rural schools is noteworthy.
- The 'Pilvai College Vartul' runs 'Wall Magazine' along with organizing a number of varied activities.
- > Street plays are performed at various villages of surrounding area to create awareness among the rural masses about the social evils.
- Consciousness regarding social accountability and value system is created through NCC and NSS activities.

SECTION - III: OVERALL ANALYSIS AND SUGGESTIONS

During the study of the SSR and in the visit to the institution the Peer Team found some features that deserve special mention. These are listed below as commendations. The Peer Team also thought it is proper to give a few suggestions for the future growth of the institution listed separately.



Commendations:

- Rich historical perspective.
- Enlightened and forward looking management.
- Concern and commitment of local village people for the college.
- Campus and buildings in natural surroundings.
- Faculty involvement in research especially in science.
- Extension work through community science center.
- Responsive administration.
- Good achievements in Sports and Games.
- Rich library facilities.
- Concern of parents and alumni for development of college.
- Awareness in students for future career and desire for learning new techniques.
- Active NCC and NSS units.
- Regular literary activities particularly in Gujarati department.

Suggestions:

- More financial support to be generated and provided by the management.
- Introduction of self financing programmes to attract more students.
- Addition of value added courses.
- Addition of more M.Sc. and M.A. programmes, atleast in Mathematics, Gujarati and Hindi.
- Filling up of vacant faculty positions.
- Training of English writing and speaking for faculty and students.
- More computer facilities in departments like Commerce, Physics and Economics.
- Computerization of Library.
- Computer courses for faculty and students.
- Special programmes like diploma in electronics for lady students.
- Case studies by Science and Commerce departments in adjoining areas.
- Better maintenance of campus.
- Starting co-operative store.
- Allocation of a hostel building for the girls.


